Executive Summary

AMICAALL is in the 2nd year of implementing the strategic Plan 2022/23-2026/27 with a theme of **Delivering Inclusive** effective services to urban Communities, The organization Vision is a healthy inclusive and productive urban Population; The Mission is To support the delivery of efficient, effective and Inclusive services tin urban Communities; & the Goal is to Strengthen the capacity of urban authorities to deliver sustainable and inclusive services to the urban communities. AMICAALL will continue to uphold Her Principles and Values Like Partnership and networking, Rights- based approach in service delivery, Transparency and accountability, Gender sensitivity, Community empowerment, Responsiveness to urban health needs, Social Inclusion & Team Work.

AMICAALL Implemented in accordance to the strategic direction encompassing priority areas such as Public Health, Environmental Protection & Water Sanitation and Hygiene, Institutional Capacity Development, Economic Opportunities, Governance, Human rights, Policy and Advocacy, and Sustainability, along with the organization's five strategic objectives. The Previous AMICAALL Uganda Chapter's 12th Annual Urban Leaders' Forum & 20th General Assembly were held on 25th – 26th October at Acholi Inn, Gulu City Council. The two day event was attended by over 300 urban leaders who included mayors and Town clerks from western, Eastern,Karamoja, central and Northern regions; AEC, ANTAC ,AMICAALL secretariat and invited Guests Including The director Partnership-UAC, Country Director -UNAIDS, Programme Specialist -UNDP, Programme Specialist -UNFPA ,NCD commissioner-MOH, among others. The Media Coverage included NBS, Daily Monitor, New Vision, Mega FM and other Local Media houses in Gulu City.

The urban Leaders forum was an opportunity for the Mayors, Town clerks and AMICAALL secretariat to gain knowledge on health Policies and strategies such as NCD Priority Areas, TB Prevention and Management, National HIV strategic Plan that impact AMICAALL Programming. The AGA ushered an opportunity to the leaders to discuss governance and Integration issues that affect their work.

The Organization maintained partnerships and Networks that supported the Implementation of activities including UNDP for NCD Prevention, advocacy and mainstreaming in Jinja and Mbale Cities, MOH for the Last mile Condom distribution In Kampala city and Wakiso district, UNAIDS for the fast track for cities project in KCCA, UAC for the Post Candlelight Activities in KCCA. AMICAALL has recently Partnered with USAID -JHU for an SBCA Project in Kaberamaido district & Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors for a Youth climate Change Project in Masaka city and Nansana Municipal council. AMICAALL participated in National events like the Candlelight Memorial Planning, National Physical Activity organized by MOH and several Technical Working Groups.

1.0 HISTORY OF AMICAALL

The Alliance of Mayors and Municipal Leaders' Initiative for Community Action on AIDS at the Local Level (AMICAALL) is an association of African Mayors and other Urban Leaders formed to support sustainable solutions to the HIV and AIDS epidemic in African Cities and Municipalities.

AMICAALL Uganda Chapter was launched on **28th November 2000** at the Mayors' Parlour City Hall – Kampala where Ugandan Mayors, under the leadership of Kampala Capital City signed the Kampala Declaration to-promote actions that contribute to limiting the spread of HIV and alleviate the social and economic impact of the epidemic on urban and peri-urban communities in Uganda.

The chapter has since registered and operated as a National Non-Government Organization primarily targeting urban local governments in the National HIV/AIDS response and spearheads the urban HIV and AIDS response. Because of its uniqueness of being the only urban-focused non-governmental organization with the mandate of urban local governments to coordinate their response, AMICAALL leverages on its mandate to strengthen the capacity of the Mayors, other elected urban Local Government Leaders as well as technical leaders to coordinate the decentralized urban HIV&AIDS response, play an oversight, stewardship and accountability role, planning and resource mobilization, advocacy and lobby, community mobilization and demand creation in order to ensure effective and efficient delivery of HIV/AIDS and other health services.

The AMICAALL Uganda Strategic Plan 2022/23–2026/27 is an expanded paradigm of service delivery in urban areas that comprehensively addresses environmental protection; public health, especially HIV and AIDS using a rights-based approach; and addressing other related health issues like malaria and non-communicable diseases afflicting urban populations in Uganda. It tackles issues related to institutional capacity development to support urban leaders to provide effective and efficient services in urban areas.

This report gives an account of the progress of implementation in line with the Five (5) Priority Programme Areas of focus and the aligned strategic Objectives.

2.0 ACHIEVEMENTS AS PER PRIORITY PROGRAMME AREA & STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES.

2.1 PUBLIC HEALTH


Strategic Objective 1: To strengthen the technical capacity of urban authorities in prevention, care and treatment of HIV and AIDS, Tuberculosis, Malaria and NCDs in their communities by 2027.

During this Financial year 2023/24, Efforts were made towards the strategic outcome; *Increased knowledge on HIV and Treatment, Reduced malaria infections and NCDs for the Urban authority leaders and communities* (Strategic Plan 2022/23-2026/27). The different contributions to this outcome are summarized in the Activities below: -

2.1.1. Healthy Cities Initiative (NCDs Programming, Advocacy and Mainstreaming in Cities) -UNDP;

Conducted two planning meetings with 60 (28 Females and 32 Males) urban leaders in Jinja and Mbale cities, These aimed at advocating for the integration of Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) into the annual city plans across various city departments. Attendees included Mayors, Councilors, Town clerks, Heads of departments such as Education, Health, Community Development, Private sector, religious leaders, Relevant Civil Society Organizations (CSOs), among others. In this meeting, the leaders gained Knowledge on NCD prevention, Management and Treatment. This knowledge acquired was helpful in mobilization and Sensitization of the Communities by the leaders to access and utilize services in the NCD screening Centres and facilities at large.

Provided education and conducted screenings for over 600 walk-in clients at the NCD screening centers: The two Walk in Screening centers in Mbale and Jinja Cities Were Located (In Main Markets) strategically to bring NCD screening services Closer to the urban Population. A total of 666 Walk in Clients (Males -299, Females-367) accessed NCD screening services in the city market-based Screening Centre. Clients were screened for Non communicable diseases like Diabetes and Hypertension from essential Parameters like weight, height, Blood sugars, Heart Pulse, body temperature. Health Education was a constant service offered to all clients through mass sensitization sessions through market community radios and individual sessions done at the Centre, Individual interactions on the risk factors of Non communication Diseases, prevention and management, Nutrition, Lifestyle practices were done by the Volunteers. In these centres, The City health offices in both cities partnered with other service providers to offer other services like Malaria rapid test, Family Planning Services, HIV testing Services and eye checkups.



Established a computerised database for each centre to keep data, monitor and report on the health of the walk-in clients. The KOBO TOOL data base that was used for capturing data and directly feeding into the District Health Information System (DHIS2) at the city level confirms that over 600 clients have received services from the Market based screening Centres in Mbale and Jinja Cities and 55% of the clients seeking for NCD screening services are Females. As the NCD activities are phasing out, AMICAALL is engaging the City Leaders for continuity and sustainability of these activities.

Conducted a mayors' campaign on the prevention and management of Non-Communicable diseases. A mayors' campaign was held in Mbale city with focus on raising awareness on the risk factors, prevention and management of NCDs in urban communities. This campaign which started with a 4 kilometer walk by the mayors and other urban Leaders on the streets of Mbale City was held during the AMICAALL Eastern regional meeting targeting the urban authorities in the eastern region (Busoga, Bukedi, Teso and Bugisu sub regions). Combining the Mayors' campaign on NCDs and the AMICAALL Eastern Regional meeting, AMICAALL raised NCDs awareness not only to the two project Cities but more urban Authorities (Cities, Municipalities, City Divisions, Municipal Divisions and Town Councils) in Eastern Uganda. AMICAALL integrated Physical activities like football and Walks as a contribution to the increased knowledge and awareness on prevention and management of NCDs in urban communities







2.1.2. Fast Track Cities Initiative in Kampala Capital City -UNAIDS.

Conducted Data Quality Assessment; This activity involved employing several methods and participatory approaches which included document review, interviews, data verification and validation as well as debrief of the health facility staff. Interviews were conducted among health workers and data validation was done at 35 health facilities. All facilities assessed had strong leadership and functional M&E systems that can facilitate collecting, aggregating and reporting quality KP & PrEP data; although there were gaps in updating the registers, facilities had links with the national M&E system at reporting level though there were some inconsistencies and missing data.





Conducted support supervision and facilitated 65 Parish Village Health Team (VHT) coordinators in distributing condoms through dispensers and ensuring regular refills in slums and key population areas. This initiative guaranteed

the distribution of condoms to the last mile in all divisions of Kampala. Supervision of the VHTs was carried out by a team of four Division Health Team coordinators in each of Kampala's five divisions.

Organized mentorship and support supervision sessions on Sexual and Gender-based Violence in KCCA. A total of 12 mentors participated, visiting 60 KCCA facilities. Ten facilities across the divisions of Rubaga, Kawempe, Makindye, and Central were reached, while Nakawa division, with the highest number of Public Health facilities, had 20 facilities visited. Teams, led by GBV focal persons of the respective divisions, engaged on-site health facility staff and in-charges during these visits. A debriefing session was held on the second day to share findings and actions aimed at enhancing services for GBV survivors, ensuring sustainability moving forward.

HIV Self testing campaign in the five KCCA divisions of Rubaga, Makindye, Rubaga, Kawempe and Central. The two days' campaign targeted the Boda boda riders in the City. The HIV self-testing campaign were flagged off by Division mayors who chair the DAC committees and were accompanied by other members of the DAC and area political leaders. Activities during the Campaigns were, Health education, HIV testing (Assisted HIV self-testing) distribution of HIV self-testing Kits condom Distributions. Key Deliverables were ; Boda-boda Men and other community members acquired knowledge on How to carry out an HIV self-test using Oraquick test kit, read and interpret results ; The community were taught on the Correct use of condom and Over 10,000 condoms were distributed; HIV Testing, Counselling and health education services were offered by the DMO's office and the Community Sensitization and mobilization were led by the Mayors and their leadership which gave a high leverage on Political and technical collaboration for improved Service delivery. 2.1.3. Social Behavior Change Activity -Scaling up "Ready to go" Interventions in Kaberamaido-JHU;

District Entry meeting; With funding from USAID, John Hopkins University's Social Behaviour Change Activity (SBCA) Contracted AMICAALL to scale up interpersonal Communication and community social behaviour Change (SBC) Intervention in 3 selected sites Kaberamaido TC, Ochero TC and Aperkira Subcounty in Kaberamaido district. The activities are being implemented at the health facility and community level, targeting households with poor indicators across TB, HIV/AIDS, Malaria, Family Planning, Nutrition, WASH, and Maternal Neonatal and Child Health. To ensure Buy in by the district, a Project Entry Meeting was conducted at the District. The Participants included Technical Leaders ; Chief Administrative Officer ,District Health Officer (DHO),Assistant DHO-Environmental Health, Assistant DHO-Maternal Child Health , District Health Educator, District Health Inspector, Biostatistician, HIV Focal Person ,Malaria Focal Person ,TB focal Person ,FP Focal Person, District Community Development Officer, District Education Officer ; Political leaders included Chair Person LCV, ,Resident District Commissioner, , Secretary for Health ,Mayor-Kaberamaido Town Council and Civil Society Organisation Pentecostal Assemblies of God.

The Meeting outputs were; 4 DHT Members selected to Support supervise the Activities , 2 Town councils Confirmed and one Subcounty Selected as project sites ,5 Health facilities selected for Health Education by the Health Assistants and Incharges



Town councils and Subcounty Entry meetings;

The Entry meetings at Kaberamaido TC, Ochero TC and Aperkira Subcounty were conducted with an aim of Informin the Leaders about the Last mile Activities, Which were to be conducted in their communities. The participants included Facility Health In charges, Town Clerk, Mayors, Health Assistant, Religious Leaders, CDO, Parish VHT coordinators, Parish Chiefs (Town Agents) OC Police, Council Executive committee.





The Meetings' outputs were; 61 Villages identified and 61 Local Council I Chairpersons and 122 VHTs Identified for Orientation and orientation dates set for each Town council/Subcounty.

2.1.4 Last Mile Condom Distribution -Ministry of health and Joint Medical Stores; AMICAALL received three health commodities from JMS consisting of Male condoms (812,160 pcs), female condoms (1000 pcs) and water-based sex lubricants (pcs). These were distributed in different areas of Kampala and Wakiso., targeting key hots spots; bars, guest houses, brothels, Music Clubs, drinking joints, garages, Video Halls, Markets, Police stations, Community Health facilities, boda boda stages, Taxi stages, Vehicle parking places, Massage parlours/Hot spurs, LC 1 Offices, landing sites, among others. The hotspots were traced from the MoH hotspots database provided, while others were mapped and identified by the VHT coordinators in their communities.



The post candlelight activities were conducted in the five KCCA divisions - Makindye, Nakawa, Rubaga, Kawempe and central. The activities which targeted the Division AIDS committees (Extended DACs) the adolescents and youths and the community at Large included conducting sensitization Meetings to create awareness about the drivers of HIV Infection; a dialogue meeting with media Personalities/Journalists on the HIV situation and the rationale of the new communication approach, Youth dialogue engagement on HIV prevention, stigma and discrimination and facilitation of extended DAC meetings in the five Divisions of KCCA. The Sensitization meeting reached 279 (Males-144, Females-135) 38 media personalities were engaged in the dialogue, 119 (Males -58, Females-61) out of school youth engaged in dialogues and 139 (Males-85, Females-54) DAC members attended the review meetings.

2. 2 AREA 2: ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AND WASH

Strategic Objective 2: To enhance the capacity of Urban Authority Leaders to deliver on environmental management by 2027.

AMICAALL has made a stride towards achieving her Strategic expected outcomes; Improved WASH practices in 40% of the urban centers; and Improved urban vegetation /Afforestation in 40% of the urban centers through the Project Activities below;

The Youth Climate Action Fund project in Urban Authorities-Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors; With Support from Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors, AMICAALL together Masaka City and Nansana Municipality have Implemented a micro grant application process for identification and selection of 39 youth groups that are engaged in Tree planting and other Eco-friendly initiatives to promote environmental protection. In Nansana Municipality, the 26 Youth groups selected have Planted trees, Created Awareness in Schools and communities; Groups are involved in micro

gardening like Kitchen gardens and home gardens. Member groups become role Models and then cascade the micro gardening to other. Visit the Links below to check the project progress updates

Social and Behavior Change Activity -Scaling up "Ready to go" Interventions in Kaberamaido-JHU; AMICAALL has promoted WASH Practices at household level through identifying Households with poor WASH practices and engaging them in health education and follow ups on the good practices maintaining handwashing facilities and handwashing after visiting the Latrine, Safe storage of drinking water. These activities are being implemented in Ochero & Kaberamaido Town council and Aperkira Subcounty.

Urban Authorities Activity Highlights

In Iganga Municipal Council, His Worship, Mayor Richard Bamululenzi has been spearheading the improvement of drainage system in the municipal. The mayor has Supervised Works and held Radio talk shows to sensitize the

communities on the importance of having an efficient drainage system in the municipality. This is in Line with AMICAALL's Strategic Direction Programme Priority 2-Environmental Protection and WASH. Improved draining in urban communities ensured health living at both household and community levels. Poor drainage leads to water pollution, Clogged pipes.

This activity is part of the road construction the municipal, Support supervision by leaders is key in ensuring ownership and sustainability.



2.3 AREA 3: INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT

Strategic objective 3: To build the leadership capacity of urban authorities to deliver effective and inclusive services by 2027.

During this FY23/24, Efforts to achieve an empowered, vibrant, efficient and effective AMICAALL secretariat reaching out to the urban Authorities aimed at the activities below,

2.3.1 Statutory meetings:

The Annual Urban Leader's Forum (ULF) and General Assembly (AGA) took place in Gulu City on October 25th and 26th, 2023, drawing the participation of 400 urban leaders. These events served as a platform for various stakeholders to convene and deliberate on sustainable urban governance in alignment with national and global health policies. Attendees included Mayors, City/Town Clerks, government officials, development partners, private sector representatives, and civil society organizations from across the nation. The program featured capacity-building sessions facilitated by entities such as the Ministry of Health's NCDs and TB departments, Uganda AIDS Commission, UNFPA, UNAIDS, and other Partners.





The Alliance Executive Committee (AEC) and National Technical and Advisory Committee (ANTAC) engagements were done both Virtually and Physically. The engagements provided an opportunity to discuss and propose practical recommendations concerning the organization's Governance, resource mobilization, visibility, and organizational development endeavors. As approved by the 20th AGA, the AMICAALL Legal Advisor, Mr. John Musede and the Secretary General of East Africa Local Government &County Association, Ms. Rose Gertrude Gamwera became co-opted members of the Alliance Executive Council.



The Central Regional meeting, hosted in Masaka City by the AEC Central Regional Representative and the Mayor of Luwero Town Council was conducted in April 2024 The pre meeting events included tree Planting activity in the City Bus Park area, Physical activities that included urban leaders walking through the Masaka city and a soccer tournament between the Political leaders and Technical Leaders from all the Urban Authorities to prevent and manage NCDs. The event was concluded with capacity-building sessions on AMICAALL's revised strategic direction, Local Economic development and wealth creation and the role of urban leaders, Standard Rules of Procedure for councils, the role of urban leaders in improving sanitation and clean water access in the urban authorities. Sixteen urban authorities (56 leaders) participated in the meeting.

The Eastern Regional meeting, hosted in Mbale City by the AEC Eastern Regional Representative and the Mayor of Busia Municipal Council was conducted in June 2023. The purpose of the campaign and regional meeting was to align the Urban Authorities' work to the AMICAALL Strategic Plan 2022/23 - 2026/27 and build capacity of urban leaders in NCDs prevention and management to scale up NCD programming, advocacy and mainstreaming in urban Authorities. The City Health Officers of Mbale & Jinja Cities Built the capacity of leaders on the role of leaders in the prevention and management of NCDs 30 Urban Authorities (over 70 leaders) participated in the regional meeting.



The Northern Regional meeting, hosted in Lira City by the AEC Northern Regional Representative and the Mayor of Paidha Town Council was conducted. The pre meeting events included tree Planting activity. The event was concluded with capacity-building sessions on AMICAALL's revised strategic direction, Local Economic development and wealth creation and the role of urban leaders, the role of urban leaders in improving sanitation and clean water access in the urban authorities. Twenty-two urban authorities (56 leaders) participated in the meeting.



The Western Regional Meeting, hosted in Hoima City by the AEC Western Regional Representative and the Mayor of Kabale Municipal South Division, drew 83 out of the expected 210 leaders. Hoima City partners organized activities like tree planting, wellness checkups, and Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) screenings. Additionally, leaders participated in capacity-building sessions on AMICAALL's revised strategic direction. The meeting also engaged in Music, Dance, and Drama sessions on the elimination of HIV stigma and discrimination, presented by the Barbara Kemigisa Foundation.

During the Central regional meeting in Masaka City, the leaders were oriented on the role of urban leaders in promoting Local Economic Development. Key Issues highlighted were:-

- Incorporating LED (Local Economic Development) activities into Local Government Planning and Budgeting.
- Creating awareness within Urban Authorities aimed at causing a paradigm shift within LGs i.e. change from consumptive nature into business orientation and investment.

- Supporting the development of new Industrial/Business parks to promote skilling of women and youth aimed • at promotion of employment and wealth creation.
- Stimulating production with a view of expanding revenue generated by LGS.
- Supporting and promotion of Private Public Partnerships.
- Facilitating the development of infrastructure i.e. roads, electricity energy, communication to boost local production and market accessibility.
- Supporting intra-private sector dialogues, cooperation and networks to encourage experience sharing.

Strategic objective 5: To strengthen the capacity of urban authorities in governance, human rights, policy and advocacy for quality service delivery by 2027.

The urban Leaders during the Central regional meeting built their capacity on Standard Rules of Procedure for councils. To appreciate their roles as council members and respect the procedures facilitated by the Former Town clerk of Kimanya Kabonera Division.. Notably the Council Prayer was shared and recited. Furthermore, The purpose of the council was re-echoed to the urban leaders; Promoting the welfare of society; Promoting the just Governance of humanity; Being the trustee of the people; Service with faithfulness to the people; Promoting the honour of God, and Advancing the interests of the people in the Local Government.

2.6: SUSTAINABILITY OF AMICAALL

The Secretariat has been actively involved in generating revenue from internal sources, including membership fees and annual subscription fees. Reminders are effectively communicated through various channels such as social media, SMS, emails and telephone calls.

AMICAALL has rebranded its logo and name to reflect its expanded focus on health and development initiatives within urban local governments. This strategic adjustment not only enhances the organization's brand but also ensures its long-term sustainability by entering new areas of operation.


3.0 WHO WE ARE

Ugandan chapter currently has over 500 urban authorities including Cities, city divisions, municipalities, municipality divisions and town councils and more urban Authorities are created every year. AMICAALL Uganda Chapter has a dual mandate and has worked with other implementing partners comprise of UNDP, UNAIDS, USAID-JHU, KCCA, UGANET, UNFPA, DGF, Straight Talk Foundation, MoLG, MOH, MoGLSD, ULGA, Strong Cities Network, UAAU, NAFOPHANU and UAC over the years.


3.1 HOW WE WORK
